Almost two dozen members and one guest, came with their genealogy research projects. Most everyone stood up to show and tell about their programs in researching their genealogy research projects. [Make sure whenever you go to the Library, to ask for a suggestion card and make a request for a genealogy section to do research. Also remember to leave the books you look at are left out for the library staff can reshel. This way they know they are being used.]

## VALE CEMETERY



{In the surveys I asked for you to fill out. Two members wanted background information on the Vale cemetery. I didn't find a great deal but this is a bit of it.}

Vale is a small public cemetery on Northside of 75 street/Hwy 50 and east of 96<sup>th</sup> Avenue at the entry to the White Caps subdivision. When turning north onto 96<sup>th</sup> Avenue take a quick right into a small parking area just before the entrance to the cemetery. The GPS coordinates are 42° 34' 03"N, and 87° 55' 27"W in Somers Township.

The first person to be buried there was the 53yr old wife the property's owner John Vale. Her name was Alice Vale and she died in 1848. By 1860 there were at least a dozen more internments there. At that time the approximate one (1) acre of land was donated to the county and then was designated as Vale cemetery. In the 1990's after a complaint by a visitor to the cemetery about the condition of the site, there were irreparably damaged and broken headstones, some eroded into the ground making the inscription barely visible plus untrimmed grasses and weeds. This is when the county took over the maintaining of the cemetery. There are only about 120 gravesites marked at this time. In the 1970's our society's former and late president Lois Stein created a record of the cemetery's inhabitants as follows and with added gravesites by John Hewes in 2003.

## **Prepare to go to Madison Historical Library**

There have been discussions of taking a trip to do research in Madison at the Historical Society's wonderful library. There you can find books for information and copied records from all 50 states and Canada to use in your research. If you choose to go there in a group or on your own here's a few things you could do before you go. First, the libraries are open when the university is in sessions. Mon-Thurs open 8 am to 9 pm and Fri-Sat 8am-5pm . Archives is open Mon-Fri 8am-5pm Sat 8am-4pm. When the university is not holding classes the hours are Mon-Sat are 8am to 5pm. Retrieval of items by staff stops 1/2 to 1 hour prior to closing. Closed on Sundays and holidays. Check online at <http://www.wisconsinhistory.org/research.asp> for any change in hours or closures.

Before going to Madison:

Set up which of your ancestors, family groups or location you want to do research on to get information?

What questions do you want to solve? Prioritize them or group them whichever will work for you.

What information is missing from your research?

Make sure to write a list of what you are looking for.

Create a list of books, pamphlet, microfilms, etc. that you want to look at.

Hard candy or Gum is good for dry mouth while working in the stacks. Resealable bottle for liquids that is only opened when you are drinking from it.

To get a list of the books, pamphlet, microfilms, etc. you want to look at go to <http://search.library.wisc.edu/>

At the online search site you can do a search of the UW Madison Memorial library and the Historical library. These two libraries are across a small square from each other. So don't freak out if you find a book you want is in the other library.

The University's Archive is on the fourth (4) floor of the Historical Society Library. To search for its holdings go to <http://www.wisconsinhistory.org/research.asp>


Make a list of the book titles, library code, and the location of the item. A small lunch, sandwich, drink, fruit, veggies, and more importantly napkin and wet wash. But food not allowed in the stacks. Drink is allowed if it has resealable cap.

Do a guided or advanced search at <http://search.library.wisc.edu/> search screen.

I entered a search for Civil War and got the following:

1. "Pennsylvania Genealogy magazine" call letter CS42.P44 1970 at the History Library with these call letters you will find this book in the stacks. Also as a magazine there will probably be a box set.
2. "Genealogy of the Bavaria, Germany, Pittsburg {sic} Pennsylvania, Germany. Marathon County, Wisconsin" (This title is confusing to me too) History Library Pamphlet Collection 81-1150 1970. for pamphlets you have to fill out a small form you get at the information desk. You fill out the form and give it back to the staff there or leave in the box they have available for it. The staff will do retrieval every 15 to 30 minutes. And it is your responsibility to check if it's in.
3. "Republic and Civil War in Spain" is at the Memorial Library Stacks regular sizing selfing is in the University's library across the square from the History library DP257 C295 1971
4. "History of the Doles-Cook Brigade, army of Northern Virginia, C.S.A.: Containing Muster rolls of each Company of the Fourth, Twelfth, Twenty-First and Forty-Fourth Georgia Regiments with a short sketch of the services of each member of the regiments." (yes that is the title). You will find this in the History Library Microforms room. There are no call letters. It's called the microforms room because There is more than just microfilms in there. Assistance is in the Microforms room.

## WISCONSIN HISTORICAL SOCIETY LIBRARY AND ARCHIVES



The Historical Society Library has 4 floors. The first floor is somewhat open with a member's desk, usually some displays. There are entries on three sides with a ramp available at the front entrance. The platform the building sits on has four set of steps. There are two steps on the north side with the father northwest has a ramp. Inside there are two sets of marble steps going up and on the south side is the elevator. This elevator is small holds maybe 4 people. Also has a tendency to be a little slow.

The second floor is the Reading Room plus the stacks and microforms room. There is a larger desk visible as you enter that is where you go to put in request for pamphlets. This information desk is run mainly by students. Into the Reading Room is the reference desk usually a librarian is available there. To the left is the computer area. The closest ones are reserved for genealogist.

To the right are plenty of tables and seats. Behind the larger desk is where the Microforms room is and assistance is available in the room. Alongside the larger desk are carts for researcher's use. Back and to the left is entry to the stacks. There are 7 levels to the stacks. In the stacks to the right are selves to leave the books on when you're finish with them. They prefer you not to restack. Then a narrow staircase with a door that leads to the other levels. Then next is a very small elevator that holds two people or one person and a cart. It has a door and screen. Wait for the outer door to close before picking the level then the screen will close on its own. There are signs telling which level in the stacks the call letters would be found. On either side of the reading room's outer areas there are benches to take lunch at.

The third floor has mainly offices but there is a little hallway that leads to a small overlook to the reading room a good place to take a lite lunch or relax for a few minutes.

The fourth floor about half way down on the left is the short hallway to the Archives. In that short hallway are lockers for your use. You can take pencil and paper, change or copy card, a camera or handheld scanner. Sometimes, the archived items maybe bigger and/or fragile and they prefer you not to try and put it in the copier. There's a desk for sign-in inside the doorway and a form to fill out so also bring ID.

GPS is the best way to get there. Or take Hwy 151/East Washinton Rd toward the capital. There are lots of signs. Either 1. turn right on first street then left at the next light onto Johnson. As you drive west the road spits, eastbound traffic is on Johnson and westbound traffic is on Gorham. Follow Gorham until it meets Wisconsin. Turn right and continues straight even thought Wisconsin will turn left. Another block down and the turns left on Langdon. Follow Langdon to Lake. There is a parking lot on lake ave if you turn left from Langdon. It's about 1 block up on the left. There is also a small parking lot if you continue on Langdon on the right and on the street. Most of these are metered with time limits. If you have a handicap plaque, metered parking is free for any meters 2 hours or more.
