### Tombstone Photo Sessions at Local Cemeteries Starring our Ancestor's Tombstones

On June 11th, at 7 pm, Judy Uelmen will present a program at Kenosha Public Library Southwest to explain our Tombstone Project to the public to generate interest and entice volunteers to help us. They will learn how they can help members of the Kenosha County Genealogy Society preserve valuable historical information in local cemeteries. The Tombstone Project needs volunteer amateur photographers, over several months, to photograph tombstones and record information for posting online.

Claudia Schiller and Suzanne Dibble will demonstrate their bucket of tools. Paula Frye will demonstrate how to do a tombstone rubbing. Jim Hackett and Sharon Madsen talk about their experiences they have had being on their own photo teams and volunteering. Jim has created spreadsheets and uploaded them on the internet. Volunteers can help as often as they are able and once trained they can do it with a partner on their own schedule. The club will have scheduled photo events throughout the remainder of the year. Volunteers need a digital camera and memory stick.

These are excellent end of life records that we want to preserve. Learn the ins and outs of this project and then dig in.

# **Bucket List Cemetery Workers**

- 1. Always carry an ID, cell phone and a whistle for emergencies. Never go alone.
- 2. Contact Judy U. for what cemetery we are working on or if a cemetery is available for photographing. If partner needed ask Judy.
- 3. Have a camera, thumb drive/SD card, and charged batteries. Start with taking a picture of the cemetery sign and map of cemetery and section you are photographing.
- 4. Bring drinking water and snacks, a hat or scarf, sun screen. Walking stick or hiking stick, portable seat, good walking shoes, gloves, a kneeling pad or kneel pads, a small spritzer bottle of water for highlighting engraving. If stone is dirty use joy dish detergent and water 50/50 solution and cloth rags to clean.
- 5. A 2 to 5 gallon bucket or large craft bag with pockets.
- 6. Apron with pockets, carpenter's apron, notebook and pen/pencil to write down what area/section you are working on, a couple plastic bags for trash. A trowel, cultivator or a serrated knife to clear soil or grass.
- 7. Pink eraser for cleaning the lichen/moss from stone, white chalk to enhance inscriptions. Flashlight to shine sideways on the stone to bring out the engraving.
- 8. Brushes-large, keep dry for cleaning the stone, medium, so you can get it wet; small, to clean out grooves (this can be a stiffer dental or toothbrush).
- 9. Rubbing paper/linen and colored wax or artist's chalk or carboff blue paper (26 inch by 5 feet = \$2.00; 26 inch by 10 feet = \$4.00), masking tape, clothes pins and a ruler.
- 10. Umbrella, car screen/mat or cardboard to block the sun or stabilize the shade from a tree or hold back flowers.
- 11. Sanitizer wipes or bottle for clean-up when done.

Inside the bronze doors of the Simmons Library is a small marble vestibule to both sides is the memorial for those 2,451 individuals who participated in World War 1

The United States entered the First World War on April 6, 1917

Troop E of the 1<sup>st</sup> Wisconsin Cavalry regiment was first sent to Camp McCoy but there was not enough horses for proper tactics and maneuvers. The soldiers also complained about the hordes of vicious mosquitoes. They then learned that the cavalry was obsolete and useless in modern warfare. Troop E was then sent to Camp MacArthur near Waco, Texas where the troop was reorganized as part of the 32<sup>nd</sup> Red Arrow Division becoming Battery E

of the 120<sup>th</sup> field Artillery regiment. They would fire over 130,000 75 mm artillery shells at the German Army before the war's end. They returned home on May 14, 1918.

Company M of the 4<sup>th</sup> Wisconsin infantry regiment also went to Camp McCoy and then onto Camp MacArthur in Texas and was reassigned to the 32<sup>nd</sup> Red Arrow Division. It was found that there was a surplus of infantrymen, so 75 of the Kenosha soldiers of Company M were reorganized into Truck Company, No. 2, 107<sup>th</sup> Supply Train, 32<sup>nd</sup> Division. They too were returned home as of May 14, 1918.

31 men were killed in action, another 45 died of non-combat deaths. Included in this list is a Kenosha soldier who was promoted to General in 1923, General Charles J. Symmonds and also 2<sup>nd</sup> Lt. James W. Martin who was the only Afro-American soldier from Kenosha. Not all the names are on the memorial, 4 WW1 soldiers who deserted their posts during the war, were left off.

For more information ask for the pamphlet at any one of the Kenosha Public Libraries. Better yet go to the Simmons Library in Simmons Library Park to see the memorial yourself.





# **MILITARY GENEALOGY**

This past meeting, we were given a talk on Military genealogy ranging from the Revolutionary War to World War 2 to the present. Our Speaker Tina Beaird is the Genealogy/Local History Librarian at the Plainfield Public Library. She graduated from Dominican University with a Master's Degree in Library and Information Science with a specialization in Archives/Preservation. She uses her training often as a Commissioner for the Oswego Historic Preservation Commission and board member of the Oswego Heritage Association. She is currently a Genealogist for the Illinois State Genealogical Society. Tina has been researching her own family tree for over twenty years and has offered profession assistance to researchers for more than ten years.

Tina started her talk with the types of Military Records such as; Enlistment records/Separation papers, Muster Rolls, Service Records, Pension records, Military service Organizations, County Histories, Soldier & Regiment Lists, and War Histories. Tina suggests that you start your search locally. If you know what region, county, township, or town your ancestor lived in or enlisted in that is the place to start. The nearer the better. Tina explained that whereas nationally or by state there may be basic information, Name, Rank, Regiment, Company, and Job. But in the county, or township, more information may be found such as family relations and friends. Sometimes letters from friends or authority figures may have been needed or be offered and may have been maintained. Check with the local Historical or Genealogy Society, or local Librarian. Ask which state archives is in the area. Also asked about local colleges, archives or reciprocals that may be accessible. Ask if their is an individual who specializes in the time period you are interested in. When visiting these libraries, ask for any unknown pictures. You may recognize a face or two or perhaps a family resemblance. You may also recognize a house or location from pictures that you have seen before in other family pictures or may have visited when younger.

There are pension files for each war and remember that if the soldier died there still maybe pension files for the widow, child or parent. There could also be county bonuses for the soldier and his family. And know that in Illinois all military service records are sealed to anyone other than the soldier who filed the paperwork. So, when looking there, you would have to accept what can be found elsewhere other than a state office. A member of the immediate family can make a request, that is the first generation relative, parent, spouse, or child, but it is very difficult, Any other relationship would not qualify. This is for any soldier's record from any war. Oklahoma has a similar restriction on death records.

Newspapers are a great source. Many local papers would list causalties of war. During various wars some local papers published letters and accounts of battles. The Revolutionary War was the first war to have reports in the field and sending back reports. This information can be found in local papers and state papers. For the Civil War, Harper's weekly was a national publication relating the details of the war sometimes with profiles of units or soldiers. Harper's weekly can be found online for free today at a website called 'Sons of the South'.

There are lesser known or remembered wars, the War of 1812, Black Hawk War, the Mexican War, and Spanish American War. There are also military records available for soldiers who served between wars. Just remember to start as locally as you can. If you need to start at the state level or nationally, then do it and follow the line down to the local. Good luck with your search.
