#### **FAMILYSEARCH WEBSITE**

#### Presented by Jane Orne

Jane Orne from the LDS FamilySearch research center came to our November meeting to demonstrate how to use the FamilySearch website. On entering the website on the home page it is best to sign in. The accounts are free and the tree you create will be maintained. You can then start your family tree.

They have you as usual, to start with yourself. As you add information for each member of your family the program searches its collected trees to see if the individual can match up with another individual on another tree. If it has no match it will say 'there is no match' and then ask you to 'add' your information to your family tree.

If possible matches are found, they will be brought up and you can see the brief information on them. You just have to click on the 'select' button of the one you feel is the match for your tree. If you don't believe any of them are a match for your tree, then below it'll say 'None of these are a match' and then an 'Add' button to push.


Go back to your tree to check the match moved into it. You will see it expand. You may even have more than the 2 or 3 generations that you saw in the matching section. Once this writer matched and got 8 generations by joining just one person to the tree. But always recheck the information to make sure you agree with it. To move through the tree, just click on the family member you want in the center. If you want to see if you have received more than what you see. Click on a grandparent and they will move to the center of the fan and you will see if there is more family farther back in your ancestors line.

The FamilySearch site has an additional aspect to it. It tries to keep the corrected group together. By this, if you find an ancestor but do not totally agree with all the data you can change it. BUT for it to change the primary you must have appropriate source materials to go with it. You don't have to scan the actual item in but must give a cite for the source. The FamilySearch site feels this is the best way to keep an accurate ancestor line for all involved.


The fan family tree is nice but some would rather have the standard ancestry tree which is available. You may even upload your photos here. And you may search records that are available to FamilySearch which is one of the top research centers.

There is also an area to create a family booklet. It incorporates all the facts you have input to your FamilySearch tree. There is also a space for you to write about each person. You can add any information there about your ancestor. This site is very fun and enjoyable to do your ancestry on. It has been changed in the last year and is much easier to use than before. Try it and enjoy.


